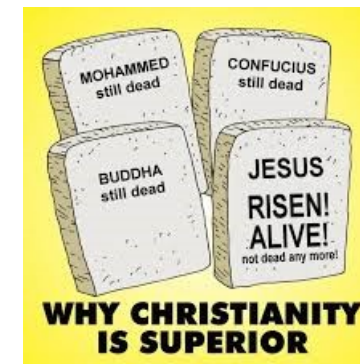

'24% of UK adults say they have watched or listened to a religious service since lockdown, of whom some say they have never been to church before. Some churches are seeing double the number of people watching online that would normally attend in person. Is this entirely a good thing? If I used to go to church every Sunday, but can now get it at home, is there less reason to go once the building is open? Most of us will say we want community, but there will be Sunday mornings where we open our iPad or phone and 'attend' from there. Will new cyber-church 'members' rush to the church they have been watching online? Being part of a church means being part of a body of people in communion around a belief in God and an experience of his love. If churches are streaming online and getting good numbers that's great! But are we doing enough to grow **community?**'

Next **Sunday 31 May** is **Pentecost Sunday**. Baptists in the UK and worldwide will be coming together for **Solidarity Sunday** to pray for people most vulnerable in the Coronavirus crisis, as well as those who are responding across the world. Though church buildings are closed, Solidarity Sunday is about reminding ourselves that there is so much good we can do –through giving, through prayer and through powerful demonstrations of unity. Kerry will be using some Solidarity Sunday resources next week.
